

#### **Journalist Report 5 March**

Having reviewed the agenda for this meeting I descended the stairs of Baulkham Hills Bowling Club anticipating another entertaining night and was not to be disappointed. With some seasoned professional speakers on the menu and the unpredictable mix of table topics thrown in we were treated to another fun night.

Sue Litt welcomed members and guests to the meeting in her usual professional approach and handed the meeting over to the Chairman Adam Cairns. As only Adam can, everyone was made to feel welcome and a relaxed atmosphere instantly enveloped the meeting, if not a little too relaxed given Adam's first joke of the evening referred to 'the clap', even before his introduction.

Adam introduced timer Anne Rorke, minute taker Joe Macri, Um/Ah counter Po Chen and handed the meeting over to acting President for the evening, Lynne Harris. Sue Sudiro was then called upon to welcome and induct our newest member Po Chen and Po assured us he was not an 'axe murderer or politician' and diligently read the members code of conduct to which the members 'chanted' their support of Po in his journey through Toastmasters. Upon conclusion our chairman Adam Cairns thanked Po, Sue and her 'moonboot' for their participation.

Dilshara was called upon to provide the toast for the evening and asked us to remember 'it's the little things in life' which often go unnoticed and unappreciated. Dilshara asked us to appreciate and smile at the 'little things in life' and I found her delivery to be quite warm, sincere and not just a little bit magical.

Sonia Morell was our Table Topics Master and in line with the night's theme introduced topical statements such as: 'Humour is the spice of life', 'Sarcasm is the lowest form of wit, 'Popular entertainment is superficial', and 'Some jokes should not be told'. Her great topics earned her the 'best other assignment award' for the night.

Adam Cairns responded took the first topic with a very witty comparison and personal example of exhibit 'A' and exhibit 'B'. In responding to the second statement Anne Rorke explained that any form of laughter that relieves tension and keeps you young is healthy and is acceptable as it isn't nasty or derogatory.

Joe Macri, in the best Table Topic for the night, informed us that popular entertainment can indeed waste a lot of energy and time and cheekily included a reference to Adam Cairns opening meeting remarks regarding missing 'My Kitchen Rules' to be present tonight. Anna Lindsay turned the fourth topic around by cleverly telling a joke herself.

Evaluators of the Table Topics Glenn and Sharath aptly concluded some good observations including good eye contact and vocal variety by Joe, 'good presence' by Anna and vey 'engaging' by Anne.

Sue Sudiro performed the general evaluator role for Part 1 of the meeting in her usual engaging self and, following supper supplied by Glenn Townsend and his entrepreneurial daughter (business cards and all), we were well into the 'meat and potatoes' events of the evening as described by our sergeant at arms Sue Litt.

Veronica Stanislaus delivered a most informative and entertaining 'Travel for Less' presentation in which she gave us some valuable hints including travelling Europe in off season, renting apartments rather than hotels (including excellent website material such as Airbnb) and 'apps' for assistance with translations. An engaging presentation which included recent photos on the projector and a delightful comment regarding French women not going out when it's raining as 'french women don't wear frizz'.

Joe Macri also provided a thought provoking presentation surrounding 'How to find more time'. Joe highlighted the areas in which we probably waste a great deal of our time and we can become desensitised by computers, mobile phones and TV. Joe suggested we diarise how we spend our waking hours and assured us we could find 5 to 10 hours a week and use them in a more purposeful and useful way. I loved Joe's reflection of his mother in laws tears at her 70<sup>th</sup> birthday and the reason given of only having 10 more years remaining.

I was looking forward to Bill Stuth's presentation of his upcoming contest speech and Bill did not disappoint, and in fact took out the 'best speech' award. 'The Other Woman' was a clever and entertaining insight into the guiding inner women in Bill's subconscious or his 'anima'. Bill's anima imagined his perfect partner in life and guided him to 'the real woman which was far better than he could ever have imagined', his wife. Lines such as 'the three of us together, my anima guiding me to the third woman'.....'I was falling in love with myself' created a vibrant and rich text which was beautifully crafted.

Speech evaluations from Dilshara and Sharath, who won the award for the night, allowed some genuine and well deserved praise to be bestowed on Veronica and Joe whilst Bill received good feedback for his upcoming contest preparation including being able to present a complicated theme easily and fluently.

Gloriana conducted the listening post admirably, Po Chen on his first assignment did well with the Um/Ah count report and got a ribbon at the end of the night to mark his enthusiasm, Anne Rorke accurately and succinctly presented the timers report and Lynne's general evaluator report on Part 2 of the meeting reminded us all of the professional approach to being positive and constructive at Toastmasters with some helpful tips on introducing a speaker including facing the audience and introduce the speaker/speech and then face the speaker and introduce the speaker/speech.

Another enjoyable evening was had by all - and not a TV in sight children.


This drew to close fun evening with a lot of banter – a trademark of the Western Lectern Toasties.
